

**EDUCATION JOBS FUND
Frequently Asked Questions
Addendum**

1. Are cooperatives eligible to receive direct payment of ED Jobs funds from the state?

Yes, cooperatives that receive direct payment of state aids under Minnesota's "primary elementary and secondary education funding formulae" are eligible to receive Ed Jobs funds. The Ed Jobs funds are allocated among Local Education Agencies (LEAs), including cooperatives, in proportion to each LEA's FY 2011 aid entitlements under the state's general education, special education (including tuition billing adjustments), and excess cost aid formulas.

2. If state general education aid generated by students served at a cooperative is paid to a school district serving as fiscal agent for the cooperative, can the Ed Jobs payments be redirected to the cooperative?

No, the state must pay the Ed Jobs funds to the LEA that receives the state general education, special education and excess cost aid.

However, an LEA that receives Ed Jobs funds based on general education aid generated by students served at a cooperative is strongly encouraged use a proportionate share of its Ed Jobs allocation for contracts with the cooperative for salaries and benefits of cooperative employees providing school-level education services. For example, if a school district serving as the fiscal host for a cooperative allocates 5% of its general education aid to the cooperative based on pupils served at the cooperative, it should strongly consider allocating 5% of the portion of its Ed Jobs allocation based on general education aid to the cooperative through a contract with the cooperative for salaries and benefits of school-level cooperative employees. This will provide the cooperative with the same share of the Ed Jobs funds as it receives of the state general education aid paid to the fiscal host school district.

3. Can Ed Job funds be used to pay salaries and benefits of special education staff?

Yes, Ed Jobs funds can be used to pay salaries and benefits for site-level special education staff, but LEAs should exercise caution in doing so, because this may result in a loss of state or federal special education aid. An LEA cannot claim an

expenditure for Ed Jobs aid that is also claimed for state or federal special education aid. That would be “double dipping”. For example, an LEA cannot use Ed Jobs funds to cover the unfunded 32% of salaries claimed for state special education aid. Ed Jobs funds can be used to cover benefits for state-funded special education staff, since these benefits are not eligible for state aid.

4. May a charter school that is an LEA use Ed Jobs funds to pay the compensation and benefits of individuals who provide school-level services but are not employees of the charter school or another LEA?

No. A charter school that is an LEA may not use Ed Jobs funds to pay for contractual school-level services provided by individuals who are not employees of the charter school or another LEA. Thus, a charter school LEA may not use Ed Jobs funds to pay for the compensation and benefits of employees of a charter management organization or an educational management organization who provide school-level educational and related services in the charter school.

5. If a charter school that is an LEA does not have any employees, how may it use its allocation of Ed Jobs funds?

If a charter school that is an LEA does not have any employees who provide school-level educational and related services, it may use the funds to hire employees to provide these services. It may also pay for the compensation and benefits of an employee of another LEA who provides such services to the charter school under a contract with the other LEA.
